Dear friends,  
 The month of December brings with it the season of Advent, and Advent is fulfilled on Christmas Day. Accordingly, Advent is designated as the season of hope: hope for the coming of a Messiah who will inaugurate a kingdom of peace, harmony, and justice. As Jesus said when he began his Galilean ministry, "The time is fulfilled and the kingdom of God has come near; repent and believe in the good news." (Mark 1:15)

Understanding Advent as a time of hope is not a problem. What is a problem, at least in terms of the way we observe the season, is the "repent" part. It's not that the gospel texts ignore this vital aspect of what it means to live in hope. Every year, one or two of the texts record the ministry of John the Baptist. He was pretty clear on this particular subject. In fact, his entire ministry was devoted to calling his people to repent. His baptism was referred to as "a baptism of repentance." In other words, the washing of the baptized that took place in the River Jordan was meant to symbolize the person's decision to cleanse him or herself on the inside by rededicating him or herself to the task of living in accordance with the law of God as they understood it.

The reason God sent John as an emissary of hope, and the reason repentance is so important when it comes to the birth of hope in our lives is this; To repent means that we are willing to do what we can to change those things that have a negative effect on our lives. If I have become drug or alcohol dependent, hope will be absent until I decide to do what is necessary to become sober. Once I repent, I will have hope again. If I have conflict in my family and have ignored doing anything about it, I will need to reach out in whatever way is appropriate or the conflict is guaranteed to remain. If my health is bad due to unhealthy habits, it will remain so until I change. Or, if there is some form of serious injustice in my

community and I fail to work for change (staying silent is one way to suggest we are okay with the way things are), then the causes of hopelessness are not going to go away.

There are many reasons people lose hope, some of which it is in our power to change. There are times in life when it's tempting to simply blame other people, circumstances, or bad luck for our lack of hope. If it's not my fault, neither do I have to do anything about it. I can sit back and complain as if I am a complete victim. In cases like this, hope will not return. We will get stuck in our disappointment and depression, thinking there is no way out. When the death of hope is caused by factors within our control, we will not experience a rebirth of hope unless we repent by doing what we can to change those negative influences, whether they come from within us, or from some other place else.

In a Christian sense, to repent means this, but also more than this. John the Baptist certainly meant that people should turn away from their negative behavior. He told soldiers to stop using violence, tax collectors to stop stealing, and everyone to share what they had with their needy neighbors. However, this alone would not lead to the birth of a hope that transcended the deeper problems of idolatry, overpowering evil in the world, and the nothingness of death. Only divine power can overcome these things and so, for John, repentance also included seeking the promises of God for mercy, forgiveness, and salvation. "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29) John insured that Jesus would have the power to do this by saying, "I baptize you with water, but one is coming after me who will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." (Mark 1:8)


A rebirth of hope in our hearts is not possible without the willingness to repent: to change the things we can, and to seek the power of God in our lives to change the things we can't. As Luther never tired of pointing out, sin is slavery. When we come to the conclusion that we are powerless to change when there exists clear possibilities to do so, we become slaves by our

own decision. When we confront things that we can't change, we rely on the power, the presence, and the promises of God as they come to us in Jesus Christ. That is the faith inspired in us by the Holy Spirit and nothing can take that away.

## From our Council President



**W**e at Hope have just gone through the time of our year for introspection and commitment of our stewardship to God, our church and our community – committing our time, talent and treasure to God's work on this earth. It is wonderful to be able to do this as

was summarized by the quotes of scripture in several Temple Talks during this season and the commitment of time and treasure by the people of Hope.

While some of these commitments relate to our normal church life, from my conversations with many in our church there are oftentimes additional commitments outside our church environment which are designed to help those less fortunate than we. The need for these this year have almost been overwhelming with wind, fire, water and earthquakes presenting increased disasters throughout the world. I think many individuals in our church have stepped up to these needs which is exciting to see. Taking advantage of these opportunities is clearly outlined in Scripture (e.g. Matthew 25: 31-46) which includes the very familiar passage:

*Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.*

In the 1970's, Mary and I lived in Memphis while I worked at St Jude Hospital. St Jude is most well known for developing the treatment for childhood leukemia but they have many additional programs including one to treat sickle cell disease and is the place where I was introduced to this disease. These last few years, Mary and I have been led to try and help people with this disease as our example of what Jesus was talking about in Matthew. Sickle cell disease is very debilitating, causes patients extreme, periodic pain throughout their life, resulting in loss of organs and death at an early age (about 40 in the US). It is genetic in origin and is caused by a mutation in one of the genes for hemoglobin. The people

with sickle cell disease originate from the parts of the world affected by malaria (Sub-Saharan Africa, parts of India and the Middle East) as the carriers of this disease, strangely enough, have a survival advantage compared to normal individuals during a malaria infection. As the US, England and other countries captured many of their slaves from Sub-Saharan Africa, most of the people with sickle cell disease in the US, England, Jamaica and other parts of the world are of African origin.

The opportunities to help these people are numerous. Mary and I are doing this in two ways. First, we have gone back to St. Jude and are supporting part of their effort to develop a gene replacement therapy for these patients. It's really a Star Wars strategy but it is now becoming possible to correct the genetic defect in sickle cell patients to provide a permanent cure. Second, we are involved with a group at Vanderbilt University in Nashville to provide improved treatment for people with sickle cell disease in underdeveloped countries where up to 95% of the children born with the disease fail to see their fifth birthday. One of the first efforts will be to start a screening program for the disease at birth in Nigeria and Ghana and to provide counseling sessions for parents of identified patients. Earlier this month, Mary and I attended a sickle cell meeting in Kingston, Jamaica. It is exciting to see that the screening, counseling and improved medical care programs recently established in this country for sickle cell disease are markedly increasing patient survival. This is not curing this disease, but simple things like the use of prophylactic antibiotics on identified patients is having a profound affect. The Vanderbilt group will be bringing this strategy to Africa, beginning initially by establishing screening centers and counseling programs.

It's hard to know at this time if these efforts in sickle cell disease will be successful, but we thank God for the opportunity to try and to be able to contribute to this process.
