Dear Friends,
 I am happy to say that I will continue to be with you for another six months. This would bring us to the end of February. Whew, that means we will get through the season of Christmas without

interruption. There is one caveat to this. Should the call committee recommend a new candidate for the position, and should the congregation approve the recommendation, and should the candidate of your choice accept and desire to begin his/her ministry before the six month period is up, then there would be a one month interval between the arrival of the new person and my departure. However, knowing the call process as I do, this is not a likely scenario. In any case, keep the call committee and the congregation as a whole in your daily prayers. The guidance of the Holy Spirit is everything in this process and we all need to be still and listen so that the Spirit's direction can be discerned in the midst of all the rules and details governing the selection of a new spiritual leader. When the church is guided by the Spirit, and when our present and future are thereby entrusted to divine guidance, then, while we may be surprised by where we end up, nevertheless, we will be where we ought to be. And this is for the good of us as individuals, and for us as a congregation. We have been planted here for a purpose and a mission. This is where the Spirit will lead us—in a way that will better enable us to fulfill the mission and calling we have received from God at this time and in this place. Pastors are called to serve the congregation in the sense of leading it to fulfill its mission. Consider the biblical book of Acts. Throughout, whether you are reading about Peter, Paul, or one of the other leaders of the early church, they led through the influence of the Holy Spirit. Nothing has changed.


What is the mission of the church? Why are we here? Any institution has a mission. A business exists to provide a product or service. A government agency exists to govern. What is the church here to do? The church is not here to sell anything. This is a common misconception in a day and age of consumer oriented religion. Rather, the church is here to witness to what God offers. Human beings cannot provide people with a saving relationship with God. Only God can do that. Only God can bring people to faith in the Gospel. What we are here to do is witness to the Gospel. People come to faith through hearing our witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ but this can happen only as the Spirit gives people the spiritual ears to hear. Recall Luther's explanation to the third article of the Apostle's Creed. "I believe that I cannot by my own understanding or effort believe in Jesus Christ my Lord, or come to him. But the Holy Spirit has called me through the Gospel..."

Our purpose and mission is to witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ in all that we say and do. That's why we are here. In our worship, our evangelism, our social outreach, our fellowship, and our youth programs, this is what the Spirit is leading us to do. When we develop goals, create programs, or do outreach, this is what these things are about—they are to be a witness to the Gospel in some sense of the word.

How do we do that? By making sure that we ourselves are spiritually centered in the Good News of Jesus Christ. Again, consider the book of Acts. What made Peter, Paul, and the others effective witnesses? The fact that their faith in what God has done for us in Jesus Christ was strong and vital. The Spirit made it so. And just as the Spirit brings others to faith, the Spirit strengthens and nourishes our own as well. Nurture your faith in Christ. Be spiritually disciplined. This is how we become good witnesses and so fulfill our calling as the Body of Christ.

"Music in Your Tribe...."

In our Tribe, Hope Lutheran church we have music. We have the *big choir* which is the congregation, the Chancel choir, and the Bells of Hope. Our tribe, LUTHERANS, have a long history of being music makers. In making music, we have traditionally heard that art and music belong to the right brain, and language and mathematics belong to the left brain. Neuroscientists now say that music is distributed throughout the brain. Neuroscientist Daniel Levetin believes that music is at the heart of being human. Music not only expresses emotion, it is crucial to how our minds work and respond to stimuli.

Educators believe that children involved in music are more likely to remain engaged in school who otherwise might be lost. In my teaching career at high school level, I had several students who continued to come to choir even though they were cutting academic classes.

Music we learn and experience in church marks the important events in our life...marriage, death, etc. Garrison Keillor says in his description of Lutherans, "linked with singing, is a moral imperative. If I am singing with you and making beautiful music, I cannot ignore you as a human being and must care for your concerns as my own".

Music in the church gives us an opportunity to change the church in positive ways and capable of forming human beings with moral and spiritual sensibilities who then will change the world within and beyond the church. Choir singers exhibit values and lifestyles consistent with a moral life and fulfill the mission of the church to serve the world beyond the local church. Fine church music will: **RENEW OUR CAPACITY FOR SONG, ENRICH MUSIC IN OUR CHURCHES, COMMUNITIES, CULTURE, ENHANCE OUR ABILITY TO PRAY AND PRAISE, LINK HEAD AND HEART, PREPARE FOR SERVICE, AND REVITALIZE THE CHURCH.**


Needed: 1000 Ties

Adult Bible Study

Sunday, September 11

The Sunday morning adult Bible study will begin again on Sunday, September 11 after Café Hope. As usual, we will meet in the Education Building. We have covered the gospel according to John through chapter 9. Previous lectures are available on the website. Whether you have missed some or even all of the previous classes doesn't matter with respect to coming on the 11th. Please join us as we continue to wade through the so-called "spiritual gospel" starting with chapter 10. And by the way, a very good follow-up on a study of John's gospel is a study of Matthew's gospel. The subject matter of both is the same, namely, God's story of salvation in Jesus Christ, but the story is told from a completely different angle. This means that our picture of Jesus and his ministry is significantly more well-rounded and detailed. This should take us to the end of the year.

New Class on Doctrine and Spirituality

Wednesday, September 14 from 1pm to 2pm

In the August "Voice of Hope", I described a possible new class on Doctrine, the Bible, Spirituality, and Luther. Sounds complicated but it isn't. Rather, it's a class designed to look at how the development of Christian doctrine and spirituality are closely related, and at how Luther's theology was consistent with both. We will begin by looking at how the spirituality of the Church Father's (3rd—6th centuries) guided their formulations of basic Christian doctrine. We will then look at how Luther's "reorientation of spirituality" represents a rediscovery of what the Christian Church had said many centuries before.

The purpose of the class is simple—proclamation of the Gospel. We will do that by looking at a segment of

the rich history of Christianity. During these years, the church struggled with many alternative interpretations of what the Bible taught about God, Jesus, salvation, ethics, and faith. In order to be faithful to biblical teaching, the church had to clarify these things for the sake of unity, and for the sake of its mission. Because biblical doctrines involve matters of the heart as well as the mind, spirituality played a large role in this. Since we continue to prepare for the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, it is important, especially for Lutherans, to understand how Luther's theology is faithful to the greater Christian Tradition.

The class will meet on Wednesday afternoons from 1:00 to 2:00 pm in the youth room. This way, we can avoid scheduling conflicts with other activities here at Hope. Start date is September 14. I anticipate 8 sessions, which means we will conclude on November 2nd. Please join us—and invite friends and neighbors.

MEN'S BREAKFAST & BIBLE STUDY

Starts Saturday, September 17 at 7:30am

Our men's breakfast/bible study will begin meeting again on Saturday, September 17th. Thereafter, we will meet on the first and third Saturday of each month in Nielsen Hall. Breakfast is served at 7:30 am and the study begins at around 8:00. We conclude with prayer at 9:00 am.

The study/discussion this year will be based on Luther's "Large Catechism". This follows the same format as the more familiar "Small Catechism" but has significantly expanded explanations of the Ten Commandments, The Lord's Prayer, The Apostle's Creed, and the Sacraments of Baptism and The Lord's Supper. The edition we will be using includes annotations that help explain Luther's context and purpose.

With great detail, Kirsi I. Stjerna introduces and annotates Luther's "Large Catechism", which the reformer offered as a radical reorientation in the matters of theology and spirituality. After diagnosing what appeared to him as the church's failure to provide proper spiritual care, Luther set out to offer a new compass for religious life. The sweeping...

... reforms he proposed took root primarily through preaching and education as people embraced the new vision and transmitted it to their children. He believed all Christian people needed a guide to comprehend the basic biblical, creedal, and sacramental teachings...the Commandments express God's expectations; the Creed proclaims God's promise; The Lord's Prayer translates law and gospel into a personal discourse with God; the sacraments offer tangible expressions of God's grace and signs to lean on in faith." All the men of Hope, young and old, are invited to join us as we experience together this spiritual "reorientation" leading up to the 500th anniversary of the Reformation.
