

Dear Friends,

The Sunday morning Bible study will continue with the gospel of Mark through June $16^{\text {th }}$. We will then take a summer vacation, starting up again on October $6^{\text {th }}$, following the Israel trip. The topic has yet to be determined. However, given the fact that attendance at the Bible study has fallen off dramatically from what it once was, perhaps I need some suggestions as to what to offer. Or, perhaps the way it is offered can be improved? In any case, Bible study is not optional for those who propose to grow in their faith. As Lutherans, everyone knows that Jesus Christ comes to us in an outer and an inner way. The two correspond with one another. Moreover, since Jesus Christ is our only source for spiritual blessings, including the assurance of salvation, one would definitely not want to neglect seeking him, asking for him, and knocking on his door. His promise is to respond in a positive way to all of these entreaties.

He comes to us in an outer way (esternally), through the word and sacraments. But these external things would be nothing but things if Jesus did not use them to penetrate our hearts through the Holy Spirit, the inner way. So, the reason we study the scriptures is that this is the way to our Lord and Savior. Through the gift of the Spirit, Jesus is emb odied in the word so that when we read and understand it, we have what it promises. Sometimes it is hard to believe in the truth of God's promises because we live in a world that contradicts it over and over again. There is only one way to deal with this problem so that we do not become one of the many Americans who used to be believers but are now in the process of becoming unbelievers. We need to read, hear, and pray about the promises found in scripture. Luther knew exactly what he was doing when he decided to translate the Bible into the language of the people There was a danger that some would twist and distort the meaning of scripture for sure. But the alternative, that no one would have access to it
was worse. Now, we take it for granted. But that's not good either. The scripture can do us no good sitting on a shelf. Unless we are committed to opening it up and reading it on a regular basis, we might as well not even have a Bible. It is not a book meant to adorn the coffee table. The Holy Spirit will speak to you, and the Spirit speaks using the story of salvation as told in scripture.

However, while there will be no Sunday morning Bible study over the summer, there will be a midweek class. This summer, I want to focus on two very important topics, one practical and one theoretical. But the two are very much related. The practical is the topic of Christian ethics, both individual and so dial. We are going to look at how faith in Jesus Christ impacts our day to day choices in both big and little ways. The theoretical topicis science and religion, specifically, certain sdentific dogmas that leave us with the impression that science and religion are mutually exdusive and will always be at war with one another for the souls of people. From a biblical and theological point of view, the two are very much related. For, the conclusions we reach regarding the origins of the world and ourselves has everything to do with the values we will live by. This dass will begin on Wednesday, July $10^{\text {th }}$ at $1: 00 \mathrm{pm}$ in the youth room. As always, invite a friend. The unchurched in particular are invited to attend.
As of the writing of this article, I have yet to leave for Norway. However, by the time you receive this, I am (hopefully) back. My guess is that we had a good time. We continue our search for a new organist and office manager. "Thank you" to Judy for filling in until we find someone to replace Tanya. The face of our church is changing. In mid-May, Jerilyn Struven and I attended the annual assembly of our Sierra Pacific Synod at the Grape Festival Grounds in Lodi. Its theme was "We Are Church Together: Working in God's Vineyard" which is based on Matthew $9: 37-38$. For the first time, the assembly was held on a single day. (It's been at least two days in the past.) Jerilyn and I were voting delegates at the assembly, a first for me. I have been a visitor at an assembly before, but this was my first time as a delegate.

So, how is the face of our church changing? Many of the speakers and presenters were Hispanic possibly a departure from the Lutheran Church of old. Some of the assembly presentations were conducted in Spanish or English or both. Some of those who had speaking parts were the children of farm workers, for example, who have grown up and been educated to contribute to society by serving as advocates for those who need help in moving on to make an honest living and improve their living conditions. Instead of a keynote speaker, we heard short faith reflections from Lutherans who represented the Immigrant Empowerment Project of the California Rural Legal Assistance Foundation, the Unite Here Local 49 of the Hospitality Union and the California Agricultural Workers Organization.

In the Bay Area, and espedally on the Peninsula, we are distant and may be somewhat insulated from the plight of immigrants who are trying to better their lives. Several Lutheran congregations, mostly in the Central Valley, have ministries that are directed towards helping those who need help to get along and get ahead.

There were 442 delegates present at the assembly, along with 69 guests and visitors. Nearly two thirds were lay, with the remainder being clergy. There were more women than men by a ratio of $56 \%$ to $43 \%$ with $1 \%$ identified as nonbinary, Almost 9\% of the delegates were persons of color or spoke a language other than English. This is a number that synod leadership would like to increase to better represent the changing face of the church.

Pastors celebrating significant anniversaries of their
ordination and congregations celebrating significant anniversaries of their founding were recognized. The online program contained wonderful write-ups about all of these. The synod is made up of nine conferences. Hope is part of the San Francisco Peninsula Conference that extends from San Francisco to Los Altos. Each conference elected a new dean for a three-year term. Our new dean is Pastor Elizabeth Ekdale from St. Mark's Lutheran Church in San Francisco.

Closer to home, I would like to encourage all voting members to attend our semi-annual congregational meeting on June $23^{\text {ad }}$ to be held immediately following worship. It is important for as many people as possible to attend for a couple of reasons. We need a quorum (50 voting members) in order to conduct business, and we also would like input from as many people as possible. We will be voting on new church council members and a new financial secretary.

where all join in to sing together. The chorus got its name from ancient Greece where the chorus joined in to sing and dance and comment on what was going on. A chorus can be a choir that sings in church.

Choral music has been written about every subject and every occasion. It can be a simple arrangement or written in complicated lines of counterpoint. Most choral music is written to be sung in four parts, but can be in more parts. Composers have written choral music based on the Catholic Mass since the 1300 's. The chorus, sometimes called the refrain, is the part that keeps coming back after each verse.

What is the job of the chorus (choir) in the church? It is not to "perform" but to lead the congregation, especially when the music is difficalt, unknown, or new to the people. The choir also helps lead the liturgy, and supports the congregation in all parts of the service. Most church choirs are usually volunteers and use the gift of music that God has given them. They're usually not professional singers, but most often are members of the congregation. Church choirs rehearse on their own time, often during the week, and then sing for the services.
