On August 7th, we will begin a midweek class on Christianity and America's founding documents. Why is this important and why

would we spend time on it? First, the connection between the two has become largely unknown. There are several reasons for this. For one thing, it simply is not being taught any more. More recently, the approach taken to the history of America's founding is based on a post-modern understanding that suggests that European colonization of North America was a disaster for the indigenous population in the form of disease, oppression, and violent dislocation. Columbus Day is now more thought of as something to bemoan than celebrate. While there is truth to this perspective, like many versions of a story, it is entirely one sided and thereby gives many people, especially young people, the impression that America is not the shining city on the hill that the pilgrims believed they were creating. But even more egregious, it tends to give the impression that Christianity was a force for evil rather than good. I personally have no problem telling the story of America's founding from the point of view of those who were excluded and oppressed. However, to emphasize this aspect of the story to the exclusion of the other is ungrateful in the extreme, given the fact that everyone who lives here today participate in the unprecedented benefits of what the founders created—people who participated in the sins of their own time, just as we participate in the sins of ours, but who nevertheless rose above the limitations they inherited from Europe. The other reason is that, over the past few decades, the constitution has been interpreted in ways that clearly betray the intentions of those who wrote it. This is the simplest thing to demonstrate. All you have to do is come to find out.

The connection between Protestant Christianity and the founding documents (The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution) is not always clearly stated. However, it can be easily demonstrated that it is there. The reason this is important to know is because it verifies something I have been aware of for a long time. While some believe the west abandoned it's Christian roots when the modern world was born out of the Enlightenment; a time when people turned to reason and science in their search for truth rather than sacred texts that recorded revelations from the past; actually, this is not the case. The ideas brought over the sea by the Protestant dissidents; people who were oppressed by old world traditions and authoritarianism; these people used the theological ideas they believed in to create a new society. For example, the Protestant idea of the "priesthood of all believers" helped contribute to the notion that is enshrined in the first amendment to the constitution which can be boiled down to one simple idea, namely, the freedom of conscience. Equality before the law, the consent of the governed as the only reasonable way to establish government authority, and basic human rights that the authorities have no right to interfere with; while these ideas can also be found in the philosophical treatises of the time, nevertheless they all grew out of the Protestant Reformation, and the experiences of various Protestant groups in the early years of the reformation of the church. New ideas are not germinated in a vacuum. They arise in the context of what came before. America's founding documents are no exception.

John Adams, among others, clearly stated that the principle of the separation of powers in the constitution was based on the biblical idea of sin. Because human beings are flawed and easily tempted to succumb to the elixir of power, it is clear that when one person or group of people are invested with all the powers of government, we will end up with a tyranny. History confirms this over and over again, even up to our own century. This is what has led to so much oppression, injustice, and war, and even genocide.

Therefore, the constitution divides government authority into three branches, designed to check one another's power and preserve the liberty of the citizenry. References such as this on various topics can be found in the letters, essays, and notes of those who attended the Continental Congresses in Philadelphia for both the writing of the Declaration and the Constitutional Congress.

Perhaps the most debated line in the Constitution is the meaning of the First Amendment clause on freedom of religion. Today, this is often referred to as "the separation of church and state." Actually, the Constitution does not say this. This is what it says. "Congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." When a group of veterans place a memorial cross in a public cemetery, is congress establishing a religion? Some courts have thought so. Or, when the government forces a group of nuns to provide birth control to employees of the convent, is it allowing for "the free exercise thereof?" Some courts think the nuns are in violation. How is that? Thomas Jefferson wrote a letter to a group of Baptists who appealed to him while he was the President because they were nervous about their own religious freedom. In his response, and because no one wanted government out of the business of religion more than Jefferson, he used the phrase of placing "a wall of separation between the church and state." His intent was to protect these Baptists from government interference. However, since the 1960's, the courts have used this phrase to interpret the meaning of the First Amendment. I don't think Jefferson would be happy. Nevertheless, it seems as though this is now settled law.

Class meets in the youth room on Wednesdays from 1:00 to 2:00 pm. If you don't already have copies of the Declaration and the Constitution, this would be a good time to get one and bring it along. I hope you are all having a great summer, and, if you are not out of town, I hope you will come and join the discussion.
