


"Knowing and sharing the good news of Hope in Christ"



ear Friends,

This is the month when our normal programs, on leave for the summer, start up again. There are several in particular that I am hoping more

people will want to take advantage of. The first is the Sunday morning Bible study which meets three Sundays a month from 11:45 to 12:30 in the Educational Building. The gospel readings for Sunday services this year are taken mostly from the gospel according to Luke and that will be our topic for class as well. Luke has become the preferred gospel for many people recently because it emphasizes several issues of concern to the society as a whole these days. In Luke's gospel, Jesus' concern for and ministry with the disadvantaged and marginalized in the Galilean society of his time receives more attention than it does in the other three gospels. For example, he confronts those who became obscenely rich, and who lived in one of the two cities in Galilee at that time, with their greedy and selfish attitude. These folks became rich, not through a successful business plan, or because they created a new and popular product. Rather, it was either because of the high tax burden imposed on laborers and small farmers, inheritance, or because they repossessed the land of folks who could not pay the high interest debt they incurred in years when the crops were less than favorable. The consequence was a wealth gap that violated the clear instructions their ancestors had received from Moses when they entered the land to possess it (instructions that originated from the God who gave them this land), and a situation where many people were reduced to begging or banditry. We see all of these characters in Jesus' parables.

Jesus' message to these folks was not only that greed is a sin, and that amassing wealth at the expense of others who were just as entitled to the bounty of this land is unjust. More than this, it was the idolatry of wealth, and the fact that this alienated a person from the grace and love of God. Therefore his warning was that, if you are not "rich toward God," you have neither the abundant life that only God can give you now, but your time on this earth will ultimately become meaningless, and you will take your dying breath while having lost everything you lived for. For Jesus, everything in the end boiled down to life in the "kingdom of God." In so far as we have entered into a relationship of trust with the love of God in Jesus Christ, we have life. This alone has eternal significance, and represents the goal of life.

Another aspect of Jesus' ministry highlighted by Luke was his treatment of women. While the first creation account in the opening chapters of Genesis gave both male and female equal status as having been created in the image of God, the men in the ancient world did not act as if this was the case. For example, while a husband could divorce his wife at will, women were not accorded the same option, should that have become necessary, even if it was for their own safety. Moreover, not being permitted to earn an income for themselves, should they have suffered a divorce, many were reduced to prostitution. Jesus freed many women from the burdens of having been condemned as sinners, he paid equal attention to them in his healing and teaching ministry, and he had women with him and his disciples as they traveled about from village to village. (Luke 8)

These are just two of the many themes Luke brings to light in his version of Jesus' life and ministry. Starting on Sunday, September 8th, we are going to begin our study. On the third Sunday of each month, the council meets, and so the study will meet on the first, second, and fourth. I hope to see you there.



It will then meet each month on the first and third Saturday of the month. We will be finishing our discussion of the book, "They Were Christians," a book about people whose faith was the foundation of their motivation to serve. However, we will

hope you will allow me to share some very personal thoughts. In June and July, I traveled to San Diego to spend time with my mother as her health started to decline. She and my father, along with my sisters and I, were at Hope from the very beginning. We lived just two blocks away, and we seemed to be at Hope more than just on Sunday mornings. For a long time, my mom was the office secretary at Hope. She was a perfectionist in all that she did, and, long before computers, she kept meticulous, hand-written church records. Family members helped her with her work at special times. After Christmas, she would type out a new church directory each year. For a full evening, she and my father would hole themselves up in the kitchen to proof-read a draft of the directory. One would read out loud the names, spelling them out, the addresses, and the phone numbers while the other followed along on the master copy. Then they would trade places and do it all again. Back in the church office the next day, she would run off copies of the directory on the mimeograph and collate the pages before stapling them together. In those days, boxes of offering envelopes were mailed out. Before the end of the year, I would go with her to the old main post office on South Ellsworth Street to carry trays of envelope boxes, each with a mailing label affixed. She made sure she could use the bulk postage permit to save the church some money.

Many of my parents' friends were people they knew from Hope. In the beginning, they worked on church activities together. In elementary school, I belonged to a group called Junior Crusaders. We met downstairs in Nielsen Hall on Saturday afternoons. (In those days, the two middle rooms formed one big square room for large group activities. This was before the education building and the sanctuary were built.) My parents oversaw that group with other parents. We had crafts, Bible stories, games, and snacks. Then a few years later, dinner groups for grown-ups, called Merrimates, were formed. They shared dinner and fellowship in each other's homes once a month or so for many years. When my mother discovered bridge, she grew to love playing it with friends from Hope.

After my father died in 2005, my mother moved to San Diego County near my sister Karen. She lived independently in the La Costa Glen retirement community in Carlsbad until May and liked nothing better than to be with family members or talk with them by phone. She was proud to live to be 98 and a half. When she became ill, she was cared for in skilled nursing at La Costa Glen. While my sisters and I were with her, we reminisced, talked, prayed, and held hands, but we knew better than to try singing to her. Instead, we played soft music on a cell phone placed on her pillow. She slipped away peacefully a few days after I left to come home. She had talked by phone or visited with all nine of her grandchildren, and she talked with her brother in Fargo (a retired Lutheran pastor) and her sister in Brooklyn. After her move south, my mother worshiped regularly at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Encinitas along with my sister and her family. Both pastors visited my mom, prayed with her, and brought communion to her. She told them and us that she had lived a good life and she was at peace. Her life was complete. As much as we all miss her, we have the assurance that she is in the presence of Jesus and with all the loved ones who went before her. Her strong faith is a wonderful legacy that she left for us all.



On the first and third Monday of each month, designated families will receive a care package that will hopefully last for two weeks. In September, we will help with the initial stocking of the Peace Pantry. For the rest of the school year, we will hopefully sponsor a specific family.

We are asking that Hope members help by donating any of the non-perishable and other essential items listed below. Each month the list will be updated to indicate the needs of the family we are sponsoring. Please bring all donations to the church narthex by Sunday, September 15 and on the third Sunday of each month in the future. If you wish to make a monetary donation, please make your check out to Hillsdale Foundation.

Non-perishable items: peanut butter, jelly, pasta, rice, can goods, can meat (chicken, tuna. etc.), can fruit, pasta sauce, can beans or dry beans, can chili or can soup, can ravioli, Box Mac n' Cheese, oatmeal, granola bars, crackers, boxed cereal, etc.

Hygiene Products: shampoo, soap, tooth paste, tooth brush, dental floss, deodorant, multivitamins, feminine hygiene products, etc.

Essential Items: socks, under shirts, Band-Aids, zip lock bags, \$25 gifts cards to Target or Safeway, Bus Passes, laundry detergent, etc.
