


"Knowing and sharing the good news of Hope in Christ"





I hope you are all doing well. Kirsten and I miss seeing all of you on Sunday morning, and I

miss the midweek and Sunday morning Bible study class when I also have the opportunity to interact with all of the attendees. I sincerely hope you are taking advantage of the services we are posting on the website. They are most assuredly not like being here, but they do offer you some time for hearing good hymns, the gospel text, and the sermon for the day. This week (April 21), I plan on trying to post in video form some of the written lectures I sent out to those who have attended the class in the past. They are not long and my goal is to give you a snapshot picture of the main characters in the biblical story. If you want copies of the written lectures, now would be a good time to ask. Just send me an email and I will respond as soon as possible.

I thought I would share some thoughts with you regarding this pandemic and how to look at this and disasters like it from a biblical point of view. Unfortunately, while I had hoped that this crisis would bring our country together in a way we haven't seen for some time, this hope was dashed as we all witnessed another political blame game break out. Well, given the story of the introduction of sin into the world through the narrative of Adam and Eve in Genesis 3, I suppose we should not be surprised. When confronted with the facts of what they had done, they too responded by blaming others for their mistakes. So, observation number one is simply this; when things go terribly wrong, rather than putting our differences aside, we blame one another. Unfortunately, this says more about us than it does about what is actually going on. However, I remain hopeful that over time, we will work this out. While mistakes will no doubt be made, nevertheless, there has yet to be a time when the United States has not ultimately prevailed. I suspect it will take a lot of patience. But learning patience is definitely a good thing.

The Bible is filled with stories of unexpected problems that led to the unfolding fulfillment of God's promises. A famine resulted in Jacob's family settling in Egypt where they prospered, multiplied, and became numerous as twelve tribes. An attempt to kill all the Hebrew male babies led to Moses being raised in the court of Pharaoh which is one of the reasons he was chosen to free God's people. The failure of King Saul as the first king of Israel led to the anointing of King David, the establishment of Jerusalem as the holiest city on earth to this day, and the unification of the twelve tribes. But as we all know, King David, as impressive a leader as he was, had a problem controlling his lust. That led to committing adultery, and murder. Nevertheless, the son born to David and Bathsheba, Solomon, ushered in the golden age in Israel's history. So, whether we are talking about a natural disaster, or the personal failings of people who were given great responsibilities, God's providence in fulfilling divine promises always prevails. How that happens can never be predicted in advance. However, the clear message is that God is ultimately in control of the future and the only way to become a benefactor of

God's purposes is to trust God. We don't know what kind of changes may come about because of this pandemic. However, we do know that we can trust God—not necessarily to keep us isolated from the negative consequences of this—but to insure that his purposes are fulfilled.

On Sunday, April 26th, the text was the appearance of the resurrected Christ on the Road to Emmaus. I used that text to try and describe another and far more profound way of describing what has changed regarding the present and future because of Jesus' death and resurrection. Entitled "A New Age Has Now Begun," I wanted to convey the fact that, because Jesus had overcome sin, evil, and death, their rule in the world is effectively over. The enemies of God's rule are like an army that has been so decimated that any resistance they continue to engage in is nothing more than a despairing attempt to go out fighting, even though they know the war is over. Those who live in fellowship with Jesus Christ through faith are living victoriously, even in their suffering and death because Christ has already determined the outcome, and he shares with us the faith, hope, and love that preserves our spirits in the midst of an attack. The vision of the book of Revelation, where the New Jerusalem is descending from Heaven to earth so that God's home is now with us, and the wiping away of every tear; this metaphorical way of describing the future conveys a message that has already been fulfilled. Sin, evil, and death are no more than a last gasp because Jesus has eliminated the power of all of them. Therefore, we can live in the assurance of that victory even now, for Christ is with us "...even to the close of the age."

At this point, we don't know what the specific consequences of this pandemic will be in the world. Will the economy bounce back? Will we fall into a recession or depression? If we open up the economic life of this country, will there be a resurgence of viral infections? If we don't, how long will it take before any hope of economic recovery is dead? These are serious questions that our leaders have to deal with. I hope they can do so without partisan bickering but rather with the behavior we all learned in kindergarten. However that goes, we can all help out in our own way. Food banks, homeless shelters, and charitable organizations of all kinds desperately need our help. If we are fortunate enough to not have suffered the loss of a job, or an income we need to buy the necessities of life, we can demonstrate that the love of Christ is stronger than any evils to the contrary. Jesus was very clear with respect to what it looks like to live in the victory of his resurrection; "Love one another as I have loved you." Love is the life force that overcame death, and for this reason, the greatest commandment is "Love the Lord your God with your whole being, and your neighbor as yourself."

Take care. Stay well. If you need help, let me or Anne Wilson know about it. We will do what we can to get you the help you need. "And may the peace of Christ, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus our Lord."

A Message from your Council President

hen I wrote my article for the April issue of the VOICE OF HOPE, we had just

entered one of the weirdest times of my life. The only other time I have ever experienced anything like it happened on a weekend in June 1973. I had just graduated from dental school at UCSF. My old car was on its last legs, and I traded it in for a new car. Two events almost collided on that weekend. I was scheduled to take my state board exam at the dental school, and my sister was getting married at Hope. The exam was scheduled in five parts: Friday afternoon, Saturday morning and afternoon, and Sunday morning and afternoon. Two of the five parts involved treating patients. The rehearsal and dinner were Friday evening, and the wedding and reception were Saturday evening. All the events were going to fit together like clockwork ... until my new car broke down on Thursday evening. I spent Friday morning waiting nervously at the dealer while the car was being repaired. The other pieces of the weekend did fit together. Holly and her mom were wedding guests, and they told me later that I looked like a zombie usher. (This was two years before Holly and I got married.) When the last part of the exam ended late Sunday afternoon, my father along with my uncle and cousin (who came from New York for the wedding) helped me move out of about six different lockers spread around the campus. I was totally drained and emotionally spent. I could breathe a little more easily after that, but I was still on edge until two weeks later when I opened a letter from the dental board that started with "Congratulations..."

Now that we are one month into shelter-inplace, I wake up in the morning with a different thought each day, as though I'm living someone else's life. Once again, I'm more tired than I should be and on an emotional roller coaster. I cannot go

into the office, and it's difficult to treat patients remotely. Dental offices are considered non-essential businesses unless there is urgent or emergency treatment needed. It's fortunate that very few of our patients have had to call. I have been able to take care of a few patients and talked with others who decided they can wait. As of this date, one week after Easter, there are still no firm guidelines regarding when and how we can return to work. Meanwhile, we are clearing our schedule week by week. My routine has been completely interrupted, and that is true in other parts of my life. We scheduled an executive committee meeting with Pastor Dan the day after Easter. As I was getting ready, I was calculating how much time it would take me to get up to church. After a while, it dawned on me that I didn't have to go anywhere, just to the computer for a Zoom meeting.

I know that I am not in this alone. Everyone, every inhabitant of this planet, is affected by this pandemic. I do not know of anything else that has had such a widely felt effect. Praver is our lifeline to God, and I must remind myself to stay in touch with Him. He assures us that He takes care of his children (us). That said, it is our responsibility to look after each other. Stay in touch with your Hope family. Make a phone call or send an email, a text, or even a card or note. Watch or listen to Sunday worship each week by following the link on our website. It can be accessed whenever you like. In response to basic life needs in our community, the church council voted to accelerate our annual benevolence contributions to local charities that provide food and shelter for people in our community. There are so many worthy charities, some of them linked to the ELCA, but charities serving those among us are where we chose to contribute. We also wanted to suggest that members of the family of Hope might want to contribute in a similar way. As I have heard it said, we will get through all this, but we don't know how life will be changed. There could be benefits to us and improvements to our lives as a result of our pandemic experience.



From the Desk of our Treasurer

Treasurer's Report: 1st Quarter 2020

Here are the 2020 financials for the church, effective March 31, 2020. The impact of our Shelter in Place order is not reflected in these numbers, but a much lower income is forecast for April and in future months.

Net Surplus	\$32,145
Net Surplus with Church Net Operating Income:	\$6,021

Income and Expenses include \$20,000 of nonbudgeted benevolences, based on last year's profits, which were distributed to several charities that most definitely need help currently: They include: Samaritan House, CALL Primrose, Home and Hope, Hillsdale Peace Pantry and CORA.

We were able to secure some money as part of the Government's Stimulus Package for small businesses - their Payroll Protection Plan. This money will help us in the months ahead, with reduced church and Easter income, and the lack of Preschool Tuition, starting in April, but it WILL NOT COVER all of the expected income shortfall.

We will keep you appraised of our financial situation and we pray that many of you will be able to help us with our expected shortfalls.
